CALL TO ORDER

Chairman Robinson called the meeting to order at 2:01 p.m. and John Stack led the Pledge of Allegiance.

PUBLIC COMMENT

None.

► A. APPROVE THE OCTOBER 4, 2023 MEETING MINUTES

Chairman Robinson asked for approval of the minutes of the October Citizens Advisory Committee meeting.

Branch Davis moved to approve the October 4, 2023 minutes; Bernie O'Connor seconded; motion unanimously carried.

►B. FOOT REQUESTS AMENDING THE FY 2023/24 THROUGH FY 2027/28 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP)

Victoria Kutney presented the following amendments to the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) for FY 2023/24 through FY 2027/28.

A copy of the request is included in Section B, which includes the following projects:

- 447125-1 SR 109 (University Blvd.) from SR 13 (San Jose Blvd.) to I-95 Resurfacing Duval County *Non-SIS*
- 447126-1 SR 228A (Emerson St. Xway) and SR 126 (Emerson St. Ext.) Resurfacing Duval County *Non-SIS*
- 422938-8 SR 23 (First Coast Xway) from east of CR 2209 to east of CR 16A Spur – New Road Construction – St. Johns County *SIS*

Ms. Kutney asked for questions.

• Lisa McGlynn asked for more detail regarding the increase in funding for these projects.

Ms. Kutney responded additional money was added to these projects due to the increased construction costs.

Lisa McGlynn asked where the funding came from.

- Mr. Sheffield responded the additional dollars came from contingency funds.
- Jim Green asked for clarification on the limits of the Emerson Street project.
 - Ms. Kutney responded she will look into it and report back.

Branch Davis moved to approve the FDOT's request to amend the FY 2023/24 through FY 2027/28 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP); Charles Pappas seconded; motion unanimously carried.

C. <u>LIST OF PRIORITY PROJECTS (LOPP)</u>

Clark Letter informed the group staff is now soliciting projects for the annual List of Priority Projects (LOPP). This is a candidate list of projects for the new fifth year of FDOT's Five Year Work Program. Submission of initial priority projects are due no later than January 26, 2024. This will enable TPO staff to prepare a first draft of the LOPP for the February meetings, with expected adoption in March.

Mr. Letter asked for questions.

- Jeff Sheffield informed the group this is their chance to have input into this exercise at the county level. Mr. Sheffield suggested that the CAC members get with their TAC counterpart.
- Chairman Robinson asked if it is required a project be in the LRTP to be considered for submission as a Region-Wide Priority project.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded if it is a capacity project it is required to be in the LRTP. We remind the counties every year to submit their priority list with their top priority project regardless of the type of project.
- John Stack wanted to know if the TAP funding is distributed on a fixed rotational basis or population, etc.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded it is based on county and not population driven. Each year a county receives the amount for that year, which is between \$1 million and \$1.2 million. This is done on a rotational basis. Splitting this small pot of money would not move the needle on any given project. The decision was made to rotate each year to a different county and they would be given the entire amount to begin to move their project forward.
- Walter Kloss wanted to know the progress that was made last year on the LOPP.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded the FDOT went live with their Public Hearing on the Tentative Work Program two weeks ago. We are in the process now of updating the status report related to those projects.

- Walter Kloss wanted to know if they would receive the document.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded we are developing the report, and the information will be provided to the members.
 - Mr. Letter responded the information should be available at the December meeting.
- Lisa McGlynn requested it be noticed that the St. Johns County members will meet immediately following the December CAC meeting.
- Mario Dipola commented St. Johns County Board of Commissioners will meet December 17 at 10 a.m.
- Pat Keogh commented it appears the jurisdictional boundaries that define the allocated resources have us competing against each other as opposed to cooperating in terms of the best return to the region. Mr. Keogh commented some of the other MPOs have a more regional perspective instead of counties competing against each other.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded many of the other MPOs across the state are dealing with a single county. There is no competition in the context that you are referencing. The reality of the process that I just mentioned empowers the counties to be part of the process versus an MPO dictating to those county members what the priorities should be. This process does not include every project that the counties provide to us. If the project is of a regional context, this process allows those projects to ultimately find their way to the final list. Historically the funding of significant projects within the region often have multicounty beneficiaries.
- Pat Keogh commented this is a socialist model with distributed resources per capita.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded the access to those resources is per capita.
- Pat Keogh commented it is a choice we make.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded it is federal policy that dictates the amount of money that comes to Florida.
- Pat Keogh asked if there is a professional association of MPOs.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded the American Planning Association is a national organization and at the state level is the Florida MPO Adsvisory Council. The MPO Advisory Council consists of all 27 MPOs within the state and meets on a quarterly basis. Florida has the most MPOs of any state in the country.

D. <u>UNIFIED PLANNING WORK PROGRAM (UPWP) FY 2024/25 THROUGH</u> FY 2025/26

Clark Letter informed the group staff is now soliciting study requests to consider for inclusion in FY 2024/25. These projects are located in "Section 5 – Special Projects" section of the UPWP and are executed by a TPO General Consultant. Submission of studies for consideration are due no later than January 26, 2024. This will enable TPO staff to prepare a first draft of the LOPP for the February meetings, with expected adoption in May.

The UPWP is the TPO's two year tasked based budget. Bi-annually, TPO staff updates the UPWP as required by state and federal regulations. The UPWP outlines all major transportation planning activities to be undertaken by the TPO for the two-year planning period beginning July 1, 2024 and ending June 30, 2026.

Mr. Letter asked for guestions. There were no guestions at this time.

E. <u>FDOT TENTATIVE WORK PROGRAM FOR FY 2025/26 THROUGH</u> <u>FY 2028/29</u>

Victoria Kutney of FDOT gave a presentation on FDOT's Tentative Work Program for FY 2025/26 through FY 2028/29.

Ms. Kutney asked for questions.

- Mario Dipola asked if the I-95 project is being moved out due to resurfacing cost increases, etc.
 - Ms. Kutney responded it is due to cost increases.
- Mario Dipola commented the Governor's advancement of projects did not include any within District 2 last year or this year.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded it was a one-time \$7 billion initiative to be delivered across the state.
- Lisa McGlynn asked why we have funding cuts.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded it was not funding cuts. It is a combination of 25-30% cost increases on projects already in the Work Program, reduced gas tax revenue, and a state-wide initiative program that developed a select number of projects to move forward that needed funding. The legislature funds a portion and they needed to find the funds for those state-wide projects to move forward.
- Lisa McGlynn asked if this is state or federal funds.

Mr. Sheffield responded it can be a combination of both. We are operating on the mindset to continue to move the early phases of a project forward.

F. SMART NORTH FLORIDA UPDATE

Clayton Levins gave the following update.

- Continuing our program with the University of Florida's Masters of Data Science students. A few projects they are working on are as follows:
 - o LISC Jacksonville
 - Community Foundation for Northeast Florida Leveraging machine learning for property appraisals to help address our region's housing crisis.
 - City of Palm Coast and City of Neptune Beach Digitize physical assets for resiliency studies.
- Bernie O'Connor commented that he would like to see work with universities and the non-profits continue.

Ms. Kutney responded she has confirmed within FDOT's system that project 447126-1 is resurfacing for SR 228A (Emerson Street Expressway) and SR126 (Emerson Street Extension).

I. CAC COMMENT

 Bernie O'Connor commented the funding shortfalls are pushing back projects that were needed for many years. For example, I-295 on the east side of Duval County north of Butler is more than five years out. The same thing with the I-95 projects that are badly needed and are now pushed out four or so years. This is unfortunate. Lisa McGlynn commented she feels I-295 was inadequate when it was initially built. Ms. McGlynn wanted to know if it was a lack of understanding of the population growth or lack of funding to build it for future growth.

Mr. Sheffield responded it is the reality of trying to reconcile investments versus building to never have to build again. Sufficient funding to build major roadways all at once is not always available. If you can get part of it built initially, then that's what you do.

For example, I-295 was an external beltway around Jacksonville. With urbanized demand around the facility, it is now another way to move within the urbanized areas. It is the evolution of growth and development.

- Jim Green commented the TAC agenda had a presentation on the Urban Boundary and Functional Classification that might have been of interest to the CAC.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded that is an exercise that has been occurring independently with the county staff. The only reason for it was the consultant had not reached some of the county staff and this was the easiest way to do so.
- Mr. Sheffield commented staff appreciates being challenged and welcomes comments like those from Pat and others. We are open to challenges and pivoting and evolving to be better for the region. We do not discourage the members from asking questions. This forces us to defend our decisions and actions.
- Mario Dipola commented it is up to us to get with the county and our counterparts on the TAC regarding the LOPP.
 - Mr. Sheffield responded it is currently a county exercise until it gets to us.
- Mario Dipola wanted to know what is the role of a CAC member versus the role as a citizen. Mr. Dipola asked how to bridge the gap.

Mr. Sheffield responded we have created more work for you in your role as a member. In theory, you would not even engage until we had a draft LOPP. This committee has said you want to get more involved in developing the LOPP. In most MPO processes, we are empowering you to go beyond that.
