CALL TO ORDER

Chairman Franklin welcomed everyone and called the Technical Advisory Committee meeting to order at 10:04 a.m. Introductions were made around the room.

PUBLIC COMMENT

None at this time.

► A. APPROVE THE NOVEMBER 3, 2021 MEETING MINUTES

Chairman Franklin asked that the November Technical Advisory Committee meeting minutes be approved.

Jerry Box moved to approve the November 3, 2021 meeting minutes; Jeremy Norsworthy seconded; motion unanimously carried.

►B. ELECTING OFFICERS

Chairman Franklin stated that according to the Technical Advisory Committee (TAC) bylaws, the Committee will elect a Chairman and a Vice Chairman at the last meeting of each calendar year.

Chairman Franklin opened the floor for nominations for Chairman. Dodie Selig nominated Lynn Rutkowski, who accepted the nomination. The Chair asked for any other nominations. Seeing none, Chairman Franklin moved to close the nominations for Chairman; seconded by Elizabeth Payne; motion unanimously carried. Lynn Rutkowski will be the 2022 TAC Chairman.

Chairman Franklin opened the floor for nominations for Vice Chairman. Stephen Smith nominated Bill Killingsworth, who accepted the nomination. The Chair asked for any other nominations. Seeing none, Chairman Franklin moved to close the nominations for Vice Chairman; seconded by Jerry Box; motion unanimously carried. Bill Killingsworth will be the 2022 TAC Vice Chairman.

►C. JTA REQUESTS AMENDING FY 2021/22 THROUGH FY 2025/26 TRANSPORTATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP)

Richard Clark presented the amendment to the Transportation Improvement Program for FY 2021/22 through FY 2025/26.

• FM#435741-2 – 2021 Federal Lands Access Program (FLAP) Grant

Mr. Clark asked for questions. There are no questions at this time.

Bill Killingsworth moved to approve the JTA's request to amend the FY 2021/22 through FY 2025/26 Transportation Improvement Program (TIP); Rodney Cooper seconded; motion unanimously carried.

D. <u>A1A Speed Design Corridor Study</u>

Wiley Page of Atkins gave a brief presentation on the A1A Speed Design Corridor Study.

Mr. Page asked for questions.

- Mr. Sheffield wanted to know if the study revealed where the pedestrian activity is concentrated or is it an assumption.
 - Mr. Page responded that it is more of an assumption, except at the amphitheater. At the time we were in the area, no one was attempting to cross the roadway.
- Mr. Sheffield wanted to know if there were any pedestrian crashes in the area.
 - Mr. Page responded that pedestrians have the mindset because there is no designated crosswalk they can cross wherever they want.

- Chairman Franklin commented that people cross anywhere along the corridor, which makes it very dangerous. Over the past few years, the bicycle and pedestrian traffic has significantly increased.
- Chris LeDew asked Mr. Page to comment on the "hawk signals" vs. the rapidly flashing beacon (RFB).

Mr. Page responded that the RFBs are more common and drivers know how to react to them. The hawk signals confuse the driver and they do not know what they are supposed to do. The benefit to the hawk signals is that they are overhead and easier for drivers to see.

The majority of the pedestrian crossings along A1A are equipped with RFBs.

- Phil Shad commented that the advantage to the hawk signal is that it has a flashing red light to alert drivers to stop.
- Colin Moore informed the group that Neptune Beach is having a hawk signal installed in January and anticipates it being fully operational in July.
- Bill Killingsworth commented in his experience RFBs confuse the driver when the light flashes, and they do not know how to react in that moment.

E. ANASTASIA BOULEVARD COMPLETE STREETS CORRIDOR STUDY

Wiley Page of Atkins gave a brief presentation on the Anastasia Boulevard Complete Streets Corridor Study.

Mr. Page asked for questions.

- Chairman Franklin thanked Atkins and the TPO for an excellent public outreach campaign to gather support and exposure for this project.
- Phong Nguyen thanked the city and county for their participation and collaboration on this project.

F. SMART NORTH FLORIDA UPDATE

Clayton Levins gave the following update.

- Neptune Beach's resiliency lab is fully funded. It will deploy technologies that will solve stormwater and resiliency issues.
- Smart Regions Zone legislation will allow four or more contiguous counties to designate a Center of Excellence to deploy funding from Enterprise Florida directly related to technology projects that would innovate public sector

processes spread across the entire smart region zone. We now have SB 1098 and will have a House bill number by the end of the week.

1. Annual List of Priority Projects (LOPP)

Staff is soliciting projects for the annual List of Priority Projects (LOPP). This is a candidate list of projects for the new fifth year of the FDOT's Five Year Work Program. Please submit your initial priority projects no later than January 21, 2022. This will enable TPO staff to prepare a first draft of the LOPP for the February meetings. The expectation will be to adopt the LOPP in March.

2. Request for Study Suggestions for the Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP) for FY 2022/23 through FY 2023/24

The UPWP is the TPO's two-year task based budget. Bi-annually, the staff updates the UPWP as required by state and federal regulation. The UPWP outlines all major transportation planning activities to be undertaken by the TPO for the two-year planning period beginning July 1, 2022 and ending June 30, 2024.

Staff is requesting studies to be included in the FY 2022/23 through FY 2023/24 UPWP no later than December 31. These projects are located in Section 5 – Special Projects section of the UPWP, and are executed by a TPO General Consultant.

• Jeff Sheffield informed the group that today is Denise Bunnewith's last day. Denise is retiring after 32 years of service.

Chairman Franklin thanked Ms. Bunnewith for her years of service.

• Jerry Box introduced CareerSource's Transportation Industry Manager, Sean Rush.
