CALL TO ORDER

Vice Chairman Norton called the meeting to order at 2:02 p.m. and Mario Dipola led the Pledge of Allegiance.

SIGNIFICANT CIRCUMSTANCE DETERMINATION

Vice Chairman Norton read the following language.

It is reasonably determined by the CAC members physically present at the meeting that those members attending virtual for personal/public safety reasons due to the COVID-19 pandemic constitutes "significant circumstance". Therefore, the members' reason for absence are approved by the quorum of CAC members physically present. By this action, members attending virtually may not only participate in debate but <u>must</u> vote, unless they have a voting conflict of interest.

Mario Dipola moved to approve that those CAC members attending virtual for personal/public safety reasons due to the COVID-19 pandemic constitutes "significant circumstance". By this action, members attending virtually may not only participate in debate but <u>must</u> vote, unless they have a voting conflict of interest; John Stack seconded; motion unanimously carried.

Chairman Chapman thanked the TPO staff and committee members for allowing the hybrid meeting format.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Mr. Sheffield informed the committee that if anyone has a comment and does not wish to speak to email Marci Larson at mlarson@northfloridatpo.com. Ms. Larson will read the comment for the record during the Public Comment portion of the meeting.

► A. APPROVE THE NOVEMBER 4, 2020 MEETING MINUTES

Chairman Chapman asked for approval of the minutes of the November Citizens Advisory Committee meeting.

- Jim Green asked that the minutes indicate those members attending "inperson".
 - Mr. Sheffield responded that the minutes can list members attending "inperson".
- Charles Pappas requested that on pg. 7 "John Pappas" be changed to "Charles Pappas".

Mario Dipola moved to approve the November 4, 2020 minutes; John Stack seconded; motion unanimously carried.

▶B. ELECTING OFFICERS

Chairman Chapman stated that according to the Citizens Advisory Committee (CAC) bylaws, the Committee will elect a Chairman and a Vice Chairman at the last meeting each calendar year.

Chairman Chapman opened the floor for nominations for Chairman. Mario Dipola nominated Bo Norton, who accepted the nomination. The Chair asked for any other nominations. Seeing none, Chairman Chapman moved to close the nominations for Chairman; seconded by John Stack; motion unanimously carried. Bo Norton will be the 2021 CAC Chairman.

Chairman Chapman opened the floor for nominations for Vice Chairman. Bo Norton nominated John Stack, who accepted the nomination. The Chair asked for any other nominations. Seeing none, Chairman Chapman moved to close the nominations for Vice Chairman; seconded by Charles Pappas; motion unanimously carried. John Stack will be the 2021 CAC Vice Chairman.

► C. CAC BYLAWS UPDATE

Marci Larson gave a brief update on the discussion held during the November meeting regarding CAC members being on select county/municipal committees that could be in conflict with being a member.

Mr. Sheffield reached out to the TPO's legal counsel for an opinion. Legal counsel responded that the wording in the bylaws is correct as presented. He did recommend that the CAC membership application be updated to include a list of committees/boards, etc. on which a prospective member may serve to avoid a conflict. Going forward, staff will ask for more explanation on the application regarding other memberships. There will also be language on the application directing those individuals with a question regarding a possible conflict, to reach out to their individual county or municipality's legal counsel.

 Jim Green wanted to know if instead of asking prospective members to list boards/committees to avoid a conflict shouldn't we ask them to list those boards/committees that would be considered a conflict.

Mr. Sheffield responded that a prospective member has no idea whether a committee/board may be a conflict. The TPO's legal counsel feels that this gives staff the opportunity to vet the application for "red flags".

 Mario Dipola wanted to know historically how has the membership been in regards to the following statement within the bylaws.

"To the maximum extent possible no fewer than seven members of the CAC shall be African American".

Ms. Larson responded that we have not been close to that number in the past. The only time that this comes into play is during our federal certification. During this time, they ask for membership by race and age. Staff strives to meet this number, but it is challenging to get participation. Once we receive the results from the 2020 census, we will have a new goal as it pertains to the diversity of membership.

Mr. Sheffield responded that it would be hard to turn down an interested citizen because they don't fit a specific demographic. Staff accepts those that are interested. That is why within the bylaws it was recommended to have At-large seats instead of a specific hard to represent geographic location.

 Mario Dipola wanted to know if we could present the information in a percentage instead of number of members. Mr. Sheffield responded that all of this is eligible for conversation. This is why we look at the bylaws every two years.

 Chairman Chapman commented that for the next bylaws update he recommends Mario Dipola to serve on the Bylaws Committee.

Mario Dipola moved to approve the update to the CAC Bylaws as presented; John Stack seconded; motion unanimously carried.

D. ST. JOHNS COUNTY SIDEWALK ASSET STRATEGY STUDY

April Bacchus presented the St. Johns County Sidewalk Asset Strategy Study.

Ms. Bacchus asked for questions.

• Mario Dipola wanted to know if there is any consideration of who the county committee will be comprised of.

Ms. Bacchus responded that the planning staff has not begun to assemble a committee.

Mr. Spofford responded that ETM recommended that the committee include five to seven individuals with expertise in planning, design, funding and construction of sidewalks.

 Mario Dipola wanted to know if the dashboard tool is available to the public.

Ms. Bacchus responded that it is not available to the public. It will be up to the county to release this to the public.

Mr. Sheffield responded that the county staff is still reviewing the tool and "vetting" it. The county will decide to what extent public access is given.

 Thomas Martin wanted to know if this presentation will be available on the website.

Mr. Sheffield responded that he will send it to the members.

 Thomas Martin wanted to know if there are any plans to upgrade crosswalks.

Ms. Bacchus responded that this effort was focused on sidewalk gaps. As part of a pedestrian safety effort, the county could evaluate the crosswalks.

• Thomas Martin wanted to know if any proposed changes in public transit would have an effect on sidewalks.

Ms. Bacchus responded that changes in the bus routes or bus stops could be reasons why the tool would need to be updated. This would be something the county steering committee would keep up with.

 Jim Green wanted to know if the CIP checklist is just looking at sidewalk projects or projects involving the parallel roadway such as capacity or resurfacing.

Ms. Bacchus responded that the study mainly focused on sidewalks to be constructed.

• John Stack wanted to know if any new technology exists for sidewalks.

Ms. Bacchus responded that we did not consider any new technologies. The evaluation was focused on identifying the gaps, scoring, and ranking them.

Austin Chapman wanted to know what are the next steps.

Ms. Bacchus responded that the report lists potential funding sources to construct sidewalks. We also included construction costs per mile. There were no estimates for specific locations.

 Austin Chapman wanted to know if this effort could be considered by the TPO for the LOPP.

Mr. Sheffield responded that the TPO could expand our efforts to fund certain activities depending on how the scope is written. At the TAC meeting, Phong Nguyen commented that the county would need to get refined costs and a plan to consider moving forward with this as a ten-year plan. Reuben Franklin also mentioned the need for a constructability component.

Mario Dipola wanted to know if any other similar studies have been done.

Ms. Bacchus responded that ETM reviewed other studies done across the country.

Mr. Manwell responded that the county and FDOT had completed sidewalk studies, and that is what we used to come up with the need-based criteria.

E. SMART NORTH FLORIDA UPDATE

Jeff Sheffield gave the following update.

- We are continuing to use the TAC to demonstrate the analytics and performance measure tool. We expect this to be available to the counties in the near future.
- The objective of the Smart North Florida initiative is to continue to foster the cooperative sharing of data through the IDE.
- Smart North Florida is officially a 501C3 and is independent of the TPO with a separate board. TPO staff will provide the back office support. The data exchange will transition under the Smart North Florida umbrella. This provides the ability to facilitate funding opportunities.
- Smart North Florida is applying for a grant to deploy broadband to one of the worst underserved neighborhoods in downtown Jacksonville.
- Bo Norton wanted to know who the county representatives/TAC members are that receive this information.

Mr. Sheffield responded that there is more than one person for a particular county on the TAC. For Clay County, it is Ed Lehman and for Keystone Heights it is Lynn Rutkowski. The IDE is live and open to anyone who wants to access the data.

Mario wanted to know if Smart North Florida would be funded separately.

Mr. Sheffield responded that Smart North Florida has evolved outside of transportation. It is a stand-alone entity and the TPO is a member. Since Smart North Florida is independent, it cannot be a grant acceptor. This allows them to consider many other funding opportunities.

F. OLD BUSINESS

1. May 6, 2020 CAC Meeting – Response Needed from Staff/FDOT

 Emergency Preparedness – Identifying and Updating Evacuation Routes, New Kings Road – Deferred by Chairman Chapman due to Ms. Miller's absence.

June 3, 2020 CAC Meeting

Emergency Preparedness – Identifying and Updating Evacuation Routes, New Kings Road

Chairman Chapman asked Celia Miller to clarify the area.

Celia Miller responded that the area is US 1 on the east and Edgewood Avenue on the west along Kings Road.

Mr. Sheffield requested that Ms. Miller reach out to Marci Larson and provide more specific information.

*To date, Ms. Larson has not received any additional information.

2. <u>June 3, 2020 CAC Meeting – Response Needed from Staff/FDOT</u>

 Mario Dipola requested a one-page summary of the State of Florida's revenue projections that evaluates the impact of the reduced gas tax.
 Mr. Dipola would also like a brief overview of the Revenue Estimating Conference. Autumn Martinage will check with Jim Knight. To date, staff is still evaluating the impact of the reduced gas tax.

The Revenue Estimating Conference will be held later this summer.

FDOT is still evaluating the impact of the reduced gas tax and will have this information at a later date. (June 3, 2020)

3. <u>September 2, 2020 CAC Meeting – Response Needed from Staff/FDOT</u>

 Jim Green wanted to know if any information is available from the Revenue Estimating Conference. Mr. Green also would like to know how the revenue stream has been affected by the pandemic (COVID-19).

Ms. Martinage responded that the Revenue Estimating Conference took place in August, and no official report is available to date. There will be a significant revenue reduction. It will not impact the current fiscal year, but will affect the next several fiscal years.

Once the information is available, Ms. Martinage will provide it to the CAC. (September 2, 2020)

TPO Board – October 8, 2020 – Larry Parks of FDOT, on behalf of Secretary Evans, reported that future budget cuts are expected due to the decline in gas tax revenues over the last several months.

4. October 8, 2020 North Florida TPO Meeting Report

• Jim Green commented that the October Board Report still does not indicate what action the Board took on each agenda item. Mr. Green also wanted to know if there was a November Board meeting.

Mr. Sheffield responded that the November Board meeting was cancelled due to the possibility of a hurricane. As to the Board Report, it was a staff oversight and will be corrected.

H. NEW BUSINESS

 Thomas Martin wanted to know if there is a transportation component to the Lot J project.

Mr. Sheffield responded that the federal grant to remove the Hart Bridge overpass included a transportation assessment. This assessment looked at the downtown infrastructure and if it could handle the assumed increase in traffic. From JTA's perspective, the U2C is to move people, which in turn reduces vehicle traffic. The DIA is making sure that the pedestrian elements are managed within that framework in the corridor.

• Thomas Martin wanted to know if the TPO will participate in the planning process for the Lot J project.

Mr. Sheffield responded that the TPO has been involved in the process as it pertains to transportation.

- Michael Wallwork commented that he supports what Mr. Martin is saying. Mr. Wallwork commented that he thinks the TPO should be more focused on transit.
- Lisa McGlynn informed the group about another tragedy near the Vilano Trail on Mickler Boulevard. Ms. McGlynn would like an update on Sun Trail funding. This area needs to be a priority.

Mr. Sheffield responded that it is already a priority and eligible for Sun Trail and TAP funding. For this year, the application process has been suspended. The process will continue if there is existing funding and projects can be identified. There is no soliciting for additional projects at this time.

• List of Priority Projects

Mr. Sheffield informed the group that the LOPP is our annual process of establishing our project priorities for each county for funding consideration.

Ms. Bunnewith will send an email within the next few days asking for each counties submission.

Unified Planning Work Program

Mr. Sheffield informed the group that now is the time to think about planning studies to be submitted for possible funding.

 Mario Dipola commented that it would be a good time to coordinate with our county staff about its priorities.

Mr. Sheffield responded that each county has studies that they would like considered for funding. Each study submitted goes on the list and then the funding is applied to those that can be completed.

- Bo Norton commented that in Clay County the planning group has a list of projects ready to go. It is easy to meet with your county's planning group to provide your input and find out what projects are on their radar.
- Mario Dipola commented that emphasis is put on the TAC members in this process.

Mr. Sheffield responded that emphasis is put on the TAC members in this process, as they are the staff from the county that participates in this process.

In the LOPP and UPWP process, the CAC members function in an advisory capacity.

 Austin Chapman commented that for the LOPP the county provides a list of projects that includes roadway, Safe Routes to Schools, and trail projects.

Mr. Sheffield responded that those are the predominate categories.

 Austin Chapman wanted to know if there is anything to prevent the county from submitting a bike/pedestrian project within that roadway list. Mr. Sheffield responded that a county can submit a bike/pedestrian project within that roadway list. Staff has challenged the counties to build this type of project into their list.

- Austin Chapman commented that we need to work with our individual counties to push this issue and get these types of projects on the list.
- Mr. Sheffield commented that the TPO staff reviews the list and keeps the projects in the order the county submitted.

The county commissions give us their list of projects and we do not veer from that list. The TAC and CAC members would need to address their issues and/or concerns with their county officials. The Board ultimately decides what they want to do. The TAC and CAC are advisory to the Board. Many MPOs do not even offer the opportunity for a CAC member to submit a study or project to be considered.

 Bo Norton commented that we are an advisory committee. The planning staff reports to the county manager and the county manager advises the county commission.

Mr. Sheffield commented that our application process requires an endorsement from a commissioner.

 Bo Norton asked staff to provide a list of the TAC counterparts for each county.

Mr. Sheffield responded that he will provide that list sorted by county.

• Austin Chapman thanked everyone for the opportunity to be chair.

The joint certification begins in January. This allows time to incorporate recommended changes into the Draft Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP). The District and the MPO create a joint certification package that includes a summary of noteworthy achievements by the MPO and, if applicable, a list of any recommendations and/or corrective actions.

The certification package and statement must be submitted to Central Office, Office of Policy Planning (OPP) no later than June 1.

Project priorities of the North Florida Transportation Planning Organization for inclusion in the new fifth year of the Florida Department of Transportation Work Program



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OVERVIEW

The North Florida Transportation Planning Organization (North Florida TPO) Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) for Fiscal Years 2021/2022 through 2025/2026 begins with preparing a "List of Priority Projects" to be used in developing the Florida Department of Transportation's (FDOT) Tentative Five Year Work Program. The "List of Priority Projects" identifies potential projects to be funded in the new fifth year (2025/2026) of the FDOT Work Program. However, by creating the Strategic Intermodal System (SIS) and the Transportation Regional Incentive Program (TRIP) in Florida, the "List of Priority Projects" now includes potential projects to be funded in other years of the FDOT Work Program under the SIS and TRIP programs. The "List of Priority Projects" includes a prioritized listing of state highway, mass transit, aviation, intermodal, and Transportation Alternative Program (TAP) and Transportation Regional Incentive Program (TRIP) projects and was approved by the North Florida TPO Board March 11, 2021¹.

The North Florida TPO expects all projects currently programmed in the FDOT Work Program to advance to the next development phase. This will ensure that implementing the 3-C planning process (continuing, cooperative, and comprehensive) in the North Florida TPO area is being implemented, as required by federal and state statutes. If FDOT cannot complete the programmed phase and advance the project to the next logical phase, it is incumbent that the agency provides an explanation to the North Florida TPO.

Revenue Estimating Conference Transportation Revenues Executive Summary December 9, 2020

The Revenue Estimating Conference met on December 9, 2020, to consider the forecast of revenues flowing into the State Transportation Trust Fund (STTF). Including the estimates for FY 2020-21, overall revenues to the STTF during the work program period ending in FY 2025-26 were increased by \$82.3 million or about 0.3 percent.

For revenues from fuel taxes, the overall forecast was shaped by recent changes in all of the following: decreased consumption of motor fuel and other fuels (diesel, aviation and off-highway fuel) related to the effects of the Coronavirus outbreak and the associated lower economic expectations going forward; the projected fuel tax rates; technological advancements in fuel efficiency and the implementation of the Corporate Average Fuel Economy (CAFE) Standards; and aviation fuel refund activity. The projection for revenues from all types of fuel was decreased by -\$8.4 million or -0.1 percent over the entire work program. Within the total for fuel-related taxes, Highway Fuel Sales Tax and the SCETS fuel tax were both raised in the later years of the new forecast, producing a combined increase of \$42.1 million for the work program period. This increase was offset by a decrease to the Aviation Fuel Tax of -\$42.6 million, or -50.1 percent. Revenues from Fuel Use Tax and Off-Highway Sales Tax were also decreased relative to the previous forecast, while the Natural Gas Fuel Tax forecast was slightly increased. A fallout of some of the other forecast changes, the Local Option Distribution over the work program was reduced by -\$3.5 million or -1.2 percent over the prior forecast.

Finally, the forecast for the Rental Car Surcharge was decreased by -\$45.7 million, or -6.0 percent. This reduction resulted primarily from the impact to tourism caused by the ongoing Coronavirus pandemic. Over the longer run, the increased use of alternatives to rental cars such as ride sharing services, destination-provided shuttles, and increased remote work options come more into play.

The forecasts for motor vehicle license and registration-related fees were previously adopted by the Highway Safety Licenses and Fees Conference held December 4, 2020. In this work program period, receipts to the STTF from motor vehicle related licenses and fees were increased by \$139.9 million or 1.7 percent over the entire work program. Motor Vehicle Licenses are up \$41.1 million, Initial Registrations are up \$70.6 million, Title Fees are up \$33.6 million, and Motor Carrier Compliance Penalties are down by -\$1.5 million over the work program period. The related transfers to the General Revenue Fund during the 2020-21 fiscal year were increased by \$3.9 million or 11.2 percent.
